An interesting website was discovered by Brendan Jackson, author of *Keeper of the Light*, who kindly shared it for us. Click this link for more details:



The "Festival" Rolled Plate Texture, 1951

For the Festival of Britain a number of companies were tasked with producing patterns that emulated crystallography. This initiative was first mooted by Dr Helen Megaw back in 1946 for the Festival Pattern Group.

The idea was that the crystalline shapes as seen under a microscope would produce patterns that could be used on all manner of items, although textiles and fabrics were the most popular choice. This would start a move towards the free-flowing designs of the early 1950s.

Just Wood Bros. and Chance tackled designs in glass and Chance's contribution was a new rolled plate texture, based on the molecular structure *apophyllite* and appropriately named Festival. The designer is shown on the leaflet (below) as Dr Beresford-Evans, a Chance employee. However, as noted in the January 1952 issue of Chance Comments, "Sadie Speight's pimple pattern" was much admired at the Building Trades Exhibition of the previous year.

So is this the same pattern? Quite possibly. The leaflet is not clear, but it quotes the pattern as arriving, "with the help of J. Beresford Evans and the Council of Industrial Design", the latter of which Sadie was involved with through its Design Research Unit. Sadie was also the wife of Leslie Martin who worked with Sir Hugh Casson who was the architect of the Festival of Britain.

Leslie Martin would eventually be knighted and Sadie became Lady Martin – not the first time that a titled designer would become associated with Chance Brothers!




Coronavirus Update
